Margaret is a Family Nurse Practitioner in the Center for Cancer Genetics and Prevention at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston, MA. For almost 25 years, she has worked as a nurse and nurse practitioner in various genetics sub-specialties, including biochemical and metabolic genetics, mitochondrial disease, neurofibromatosis and cancer genetics.

Margaret joined the Center for Cancer Genetics in 2012. She manages patients with inherited risk for breast, gynecological and gastrointestinal cancers. In addition to delivering patient care, she reviews family history, educates patients regarding health behaviors, chemoprevention, risk reduction surgery and psych/social issues associated with genetic risk. Margaret is a sub-investigator in a number of clinical research studies. She is a project leader for a quality improvement initiative to enhance the delivery of patient care through improved operations and technology. Her interests include health care disparities and the family perspective of inherited genetic conditions.
